Collecting surveys from parents on possible discussion topics or professional development for teachers on how to work with parents as equal partners is one way to educate school personnel with parental assistance.

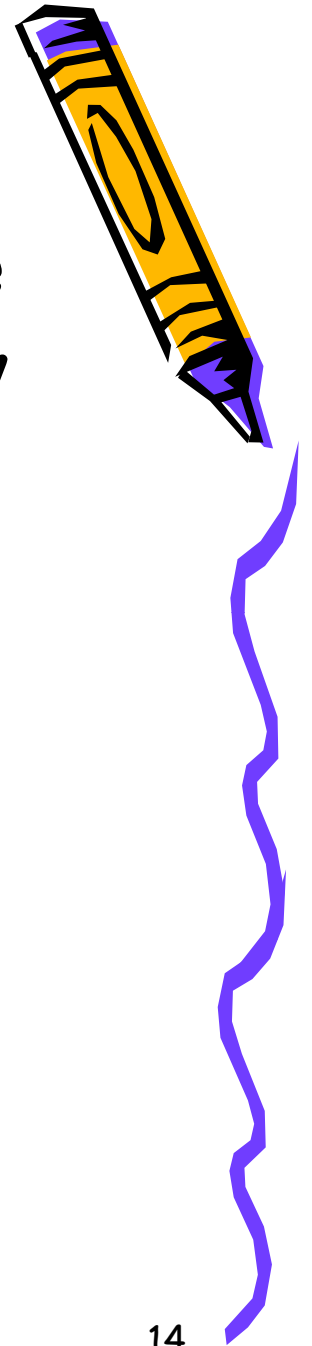
